Looking back at last May's message, I see that I was spring cleaning and that my sewing space needed a major reorganization. It *still* needs reorganizing. That is, I feel, another facet of this wonderful hobby/pastime/passion. We are constantly tweaking our sewing areas as well as reorganizing our tools, threads, fabrics and patterns.

I still have fabric that needs carding and WIPs that need quilting and binding. I still have one that just needs the border sewn on and then it can go off to be quilted. However, I don't see the number of my UFO/WIP quilts decreasing any time soon. In fact, I'm just adding to my WIPs at this point, with two more quilts in the planning stage.

The warmer weather is on its way (well, it should be coming soon – despite the snow pellets I experienced yesterday), so I am planning to card fabric while enjoying my backyard deck. I am also planning to use Killashandra (my Featherweight) out on the deck this summer. I have one throw quilt that I started on her and need to finish on her (and yes, I do need to *find* that UFO first). The Featherweight is so easy to move and use, that it is perfect for a little outdoor sewing. Does anyone else sew outside? It can be challenging if there is any amount of wind...those pieces of fabric will take flight!

Finally, a reminder that the judging for the **President's Challenge** Quilt (Inspiration: A Return to Childhood) will take place at the May meeting. Please bring your finished submission to the May meeting by **6:30 p.m.** Please pick up your number/crayon at the table by the entrance.

A "Round Robin" Evening

Last April we called it "A Learning Journey". While a different name, it will still be another evening of learning and fun for all! Three guild members will share some quilt techniques and ideas while the fourth will find out what YOU want from the Halton Quilters Guild!

Sue Paquette will present **English Paper Piecing**. But this is NOT the paper piecing where you sew over your pattern or use freezer paper. Instead, you piece various shapes together to form a design that may be used in many ways. WARNING: It can be very addictive!

Brenda Moss will present **Favourite Gadgets and Tools**. While we all have our favourites, our sewing kit always has room for one more gadget or tool!

Sue Curran will present different tips and tricks for **Creating a Stained Glass Look**. She will have examples of two different methods used to create quilts that look like stained glass. Is one better than the other? What fabric looks best?

Katherine Hunter will present a detailed survey to get important feedback from YOU, the members, on how YOUR Executive might plan for the future (guild meetings, guilt shows, and such).



Each demonstration will be set up at separate tables with members divided into smaller groups. A timer will be set for 15 minutes so each group will be able to rotate around the room. Then we will break for tea/coffee and continue with the business portion of the meeting.

We have a proud history of making these "comfort quilts" and providing an important service to our community, donating quilts to local groups who make a difference and to individuals in need of comfort.

This past guild year we began donating quilts to **Radius Child and Youth Services**, a community-based organization providing clinical assessment and counselling services to children, youth and families affected by abuse, neglect or domestic violence since 1983.

Thank you so much for your donation of quilts for our young clients! They really make a difference, bringing comfort during therapy as well as at home. Radius clients range in age from 3 to 18 years and your beautiful quilts have brought many smiles. For many clients, your donation was the high-light of the Holiday Season. Please know that the Halton Quilters Guild has made a big difference to our young clients on their healing journeys.

Here are some quotes from Radius therapists about the difference you have made to children and youth affected by abuse, neglect, and interpersonal violence:

"These beautiful quilts really brought joy to my clients! One of my clients (a teenage boy) said 'I can't believe someone would do this for me. Living in a group home, I don't get new things. I will make sure to take care of my quilt'. Thank you for helping Radius clients." (Therapist Sara)

"My clients, two sisters ages 5 and 8, were over the moon when I gave them their quilts! Thank you for being so thoughtful, you are helping kids when they need it the most." (Therapist Kelsey)

UPDATE: Unfortunately the Ministry of Health has now cancelled their funding effective May 31st. There are currently 150 children in treatment and another 200 on the waiting list. Responsibility for these children will transfer to Reach Out Centre for Kids (ROCK).

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Knots and Patches

Betcha can't make just one!!

After **Brenda Logan** from "Conquering Mount Scrapmore" presented her trunk show at our January meeting, my life was forever changed! Brenda is very fond of the **Potato Chip Quilt Block** and her followers post a lot of them. Suffice it to say, this block has taken my quilting world by storm. I have made a number of them including baby, lap, and larger quilts. Imagine my delight when the **Sarnia Quilt Guild** presented Brenda with a booklet of Potato Chip Quilt variations – 31 of them! I was off on a new adventure.



This was a baby quilt – no sashing and no borders. 12 blocks make up into a nice size for a small quilt (36.5" x 48.5").




Twenty blocks make up this quilt. I was missing a couple so put star blocks in two of the corners. More 'chips' used in border.(~54" X 72")



Added sashing and cornerstones to create a different look. Love that you can use any of the scrap fabrics no matter the colours and it still looks fabulous! The black sashing and border pulls it all together.

To make each block you need 18 rectangles. The measurements are in a 2:1 ratio plus 1/2". I used 2.5" X 4.5" but have seen many made with 2" x 3.5", 3.5" x 6.5" and so on.



Starting in the centre, sew 2 blocks together. Follow the illustration at the left to keep adding to the block similar to a modified log cabin. Some quilters keep going adding more and more rows making one very large block.

If you want to make some variations of this quilt, you can find all of them in the **Potato Chip Booklet** on the "Conquering Mount Scrapmore" Facebook page. It is under the file tab and can be downloaded and saved to your files or printed. There is even a colouring page so you can audition colours if you don't like the scrappy look or perhaps come up with another variation.

I attend another sewing group on Monday mornings. One of our celebrations this year was Chinese New Year. For three weeks previous to our celebration, I had the members pick out 18 rectangles from my overloaded bin of pieces and place them in an envelope with their names having no idea why they were doing this. On our Chinese New Year day I introduced them to the block — everyone had fun putting their pieces together with a few quilters trading in for another colour or two. The blocks were then sewn together, quilted and bound, and these will be drawn for at our celebration in June. It was very appropriate to make the Potato Chip block for our celebration as who can have a party without potato chips!! (cont'd on the next page)

Knots and Patches (cont'd)



Basic 4 X 5 block quilt with sashing and cornerstones. Quite striking in person as the few spots of colour really emphasize the black and white. The middle fabric on the border has tiny 1/2" black and white pinwheels. No, I did not make them. They were printed on the fabric. I have been wanting to make a black and white quilt and this was a lot of fun!

Here are a few more "scrappy" quilts!



This is the "Spiral" variation from the Potato Chip Booklet. In person the spirals do not jump out like they do in this photo. In keeping with the scrappy theme the border has leftover half square triangles from another project.



Basically blue – It seems this is almost everyone's favourite colour for a quilt. The "Basketweave" variation really highlights the dark and light fabrics.


There are many videos on YouTube with tutorials for this block and your favourite YouTube quilter has probably uploaded one or two. If you are making mixed colour blocks from a bin of rectangles it is easy to make many at one time — sewing all the centres and each addition one after the other in chain-piecing style. Some of the variations require certain colour values or colours be placed in specific spots in the block and may require a little more attention paid. The blocks go together quickly and are the perfect project when you have 5-10 minutes to sit and sew.

Whichever method you use - Betcha can't make just one!!

1994/1995 (cont'd from April's issue)

In February the Moving Committee presented five possible locations for the next guild year, with over half the members voting to chose the **Mainway Recreation Centre!** Meetings were scheduled for the first Wednesday of the month from 7:30 to 10:30! (*These members were night owls!*)

It was decided to start a history of our guild! (So glad they did!)

Mainway was also the location for the Quilt Show which had seven merchants in attendance. Prior to the show members sold tickets for the Raffle Quilt at the Burlington Mall. Members were also busy making goodies for the tea room.

The May General Meeting was held as a banquet at the Tyandaga Municipal Golf Club during which time the Quilt Show awards were presented.

Our guild donated a quilt to the recently formed **Oakville Quilter's Guild** to help raise funds for their start up. The "Hot Air Balloon" quilt was sold by silent auction at their June meeting.

In the summer several of our members often participated in the annual **Country Quilt Fest** at the Agricultural Museum in Milton.

1995/1996 (144 members)

Increased expenses made it necessary to increase membership fees to \$30 with the fee for guests \$4. (Considering this was almost 30 years ago, I think our guild has done well keeping our fees at \$40!)

A committee was formed to plan our guild's 20th Anniversary Celebration for the fall of 1997. The **Teacher's Corner** featured guild members **Jill Pettit**, **Marg Pentecost** and **Jane Webster**. The theme for the Guild Block Challenge was **My Country**, or "What does Canada mean to you?"

Now that the guild meets at Mainway, with its much needed space, it was decided to plan a **Cuddle Quilt Afternoon** / **Evening** in place of the regular February meeting. The Outreach Committee acquired labels that read "Made with Love by Halton Quilters' Guild" (*still have that apostrophe!*) to be attached to all quilts donated by our guild.

Due to expense, the Executive decided to return to the Pot Luck Dinner format rather than a banquet. Members were asked to sign up at the May meeting so as to avoid "10 macaroni salads" lol. (I do think we manage quite well with our current letter arrangement!)

By the way, there is a recurring theme in the newsletters over the years - overdue library books!



... from one guild to another!

Our guild recently received a wonderful letter from **Carol Seaman**, a fellow quilter in Owen Sound. It's another example of how quilting connects us. I emailed Carol to ask permission to print parts of her letter, writing "I had a big smile on my face after reading it! I love the connections that being part of the quilting world bring." Her reply included some more lovely words about Rosemary!

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I belong to the **Bluewater Quilters Guild** in Owen Sound. We receive a copy of your monthly newsletter and I am always inspired by the things your guild is doing in your community.

I have been reading your history and felt I needed to add to it. In 1986 **Noreen Smale** moved from Oakville to Owen Sound to retire. We met at night school class along with a woman who taught sewing classes. One of the things we did there was shadow quilting. I was interested in learning to quilt, as my grandmother had been a quilter.

So that fall we met to talk about a quilt guild, and in April of 1987 our guild was born! Noreen had many contacts as she had been a member of the Halton Guild. I think if it hadn't been for this, we would not have grown as fast as we did.

In September 1987 **Rosemary Makhan** came to speak at a meeting, stayed the night with Noreen and taught us applique the next day. She gave us a pattern of her applique quilt she was doing for her parents 50th!

In the spring of 1988 a box of quilt books arrived from the Halton Guild to begin our library - they may have been used, but were most appreciated. **Lydia Quigley** came and spoke in October and taught us "Trip Around the World" - I must add that both came for a very reduced fee, stayed with Noreen and made the class very affordable for new quilters!! One of our bus trips was to the **Halton Guild Quilt Show** and was most enjoyable.

Without the Halton Quilters Guild, the Bluewater Quilters would not be celebrating our **37th Anniversary** with 123 members this Monday (April15)! Thank you for your encouragement all those years ago - keep quilting and sharing with the community.

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When I read your history about Rosemary, it took me right back to the time she came to our guild and how gracious and helpful she was and I couldn't not share about her - she was a very special lady. I also remember attending a show with the York Heritage Quilters Guild and Rosemary arrived just as our bus was unloading. She came right over to welcome us to the York show - she recognized some from her class and asked about how each was progressing - a great memory.

The quilting community is full of surprises! You are welcome to use any or all of my email for your newsletter. When I think back to all that has happened in the last 40 years, I know that many of the wonderful ladies that helped us get started are gone, but their legacy lives on and inspires others. Another quilter and I teach a beginners course and the newbies are always interested in how we learned the basics!! Things have gotten easier and the internet has opened up a lot of avenues for creativity. Best wishes to all of your members and hopefully we'll meet somewhere at a quilting event in the future!!


